Leah Denbok gives voice to the homeless

Fifty-five people attended the street photography group's talk with Leah Denbok on February 11. The street portrait photographer's message was clear, "Help the homeless whatever way you can and reach out to them as people."

Denbok has been photographing the homeless with her Dad, Tim, since she was 14. Now 19 and taking photography at Sheridan College, she isn't slowing down, in fact the third book in her series, "Nowhere to Call Home" is being published and is getting her message out.

The audience learned about her process of using a black cloth behind the homeless to make her stark photographs. While her Dad interviews, she captures the image.

"My photographs are very simple---even starkly simple. This is done for a reason. I want nothing to hinder the viewer from looking at the

individual in front of them---to gaze into their eyes, to look at their facial expressions, to observe their hand gestures." She goes on to explain, "They tell a story of pain and anguish, a story of addiction, a story of rejection, a story of disappointment, a story of broken dreams, but often also a story of hope and the will to survive.

Denbok's work will be displayed at the Kitchener City Hall, Rotunda Gallery at 200 King Street West, Kitchener during the month of March. Join her at the opening reception, Thursday, March 5 at 6 p.m.


Studio Group: March 24

Do you ever find yourself walking down the street and an idea seems to rise up out of nowhere to slap you in the face?

Latow has a long tradition of giving. Through its association with Arts Burlington, Latow was instrumental in raising funds to help build the Art Gallery of Burlington. Over the years Latow has continued its support of the AGB by assisting with fund raising efforts as well as directly contributing its own funds in support of specific AGB projects and purchases. I feel giving support to our community is an important role for Latow.

One function of a club President is considering how the club can further benefit the photographic community. Helping young photographers is something I feel we are well equipped to do. With the wealth of knowledge, experience and resources within Latow, assisting the next generation of photographers is a natural fit.

This month the Street Photography Group, led by Monique Campbell and Frank Myers and assisted by Johnny Larson, introduced us to the accomplished photographer Leah Denbok. You would swear that Leah's pensive portraits of people experiencing homelessness are those of a seasoned master. So it's astonishing to learn that she is only 19 years old, and currently in her second year of Sheridan's photography program.

Perhaps what is even more startling is that she started this project when she was 15 years old. Since then Leah has photographed over 500 people, paying each of her subjects a \$10 modelling fee from her own pocket.

She publishes her images, along with the stories of her subjects, in a series of books called *Nowhere To Call Home*. And she donates the profits to charitable organizations helping the homeless.

It was walking home from this amazing evening, learning about Leah's project, that I got my slap in the face. Lending support to Leah's project would be a win-win. We would be supporting homeless people, and also encouraging a young person as she pursues her photographic journey. At the February Board meeting the executive unanimously approved funds to cover modelling fees for Leah's next 100 subjects. Win-win.



André Kertész; A Life in Photographs exhibition at Stephen Bulger Gallery is a must see! The retrospective show represents the many sides to Kertész's work.

A great number of his famous photographs are included and some lesser known ones round out the exhibition. My only criticism is that they did not include any of his "On Reading" photographs, a series he developed of making images of people reading in public.

I attended the guided tour of the exhibition with Robert Gurbo, Curator of the André Kertész estate and learned much about the photographer at the opening reception.

Kertész's poetic photographs span 70 years of his work and is the eighth solo exhibition at the Toronto photography gallery. On display until March 21, 2020



Viewfinder - Quotes to Inspire You

That's kind of what I aspire to in my shots ... to let people see what it's like right in the centre of making movies in the 20^{th} and 21^{st} centuries – Jeff Bridges

While browsing an issue of Amateur Photographer magazine, I was surprised to discover that a favourite actor of mine, Jeff Bridges, has been shooting on-set photographs for most of his career with a very unique camera. His second book of on-set photographs using his beloved Widelux camera has just been published.

Bridges has loved photography since his teenage years, when he set up a little darkroom in his bathroom, but he was truly hooked when a photographer came into his high school to take their class picture using this "funny camera with a



panning lens." He encountered it again when his wedding photos were shot using this camera, and his wife subsequently gave him one as a wedding gift. Since then the Widelux, a fully mechanical swing-lens panoramic camera first developed in Japan in 1958, has been the camera he primarily uses.

One of his photo heroes, as he puts it, is Jacques Henri Lartigue, a French photographer known for his spontaneous, joyful images that Bridges suspects might have also been taken with a panning shutter.

I really have kind of a love affair with this camera. I think it sees more like the [human] eye and it almost has peripheral vision. It's very much like the movie screen format, so I like that aspect of it. – Jeff Bridges

It is an odd-looking rectangular camera with no visible lens in the front. The camera has a slit that exposes the film as the lens pivots on a horizontal arc with the Widelux 7 capturing a 120 -degree field of view. This means that you can point the camera in one direction and anything or anyone standing beside you is going to be in the shot. One reviewer noted the bubble level on top of the camera is essential since the viewfinder is useless and gives you only an approximation of what the lens will photograph.

Though you capture the entire scene in a single frame, events shown at the left happen slightly before those on the right so it introduces the dimension of time into your photography. Because the circular motion occurs horizontally, vertical lines remain straight while horizontal lines are bowed. The camera does not distort or stretch objects near the edge of the frame.

There is no focus on it and no light meter, so you just focus with depth of field and set the camera between f/2.8 and f11. There are also only 3 shutter speeds to pick from: 1/15, 1/125 and 1/250. Bridges chooses to shoot in black and white, often at f11 at 1/15th of a second with ISO 3200 or 6400 since studio light is so dim.

There's beautiful colour photography as well but it certainly isn't as meaningful as black and white, man, that I love, even in the movies. If you look at a Kubrick movie – Doctor Strangelove or any of those – and you see those rich blacks ... wow, I love that – Jeff Bridges

Paul Sparrow, Latow International AV Festival


The Latow International AV Festival has grown to be the premier international showcase of AV presentations from around the world that use different audio-visual techniques to tell stories or to show off artistic visions.

Diane Arbus at Art Gallery of Ontario:

In 2016 the **Art Gallery of Ontario** acquired the world's second largest collection of photographs by **Diane Arbus**. On February 22 the AGO opened a major exhibition featuring 150 of these photographs. I've seen it and it's not to be missed.

Diane Arbus revolutionized portraiture through the range of subjects she captured and her distinctive style. Arbus worked in and around New York City, selecting her subjects for their uniqueness – including couples, children, nudists, suburban families, circus performers and celebrities, among others she encountered in public spaces. This is the first solo Arbus exhibition in Canada in almost 30 years.

Currently the AGO offers a special **\$35 annual pass**, that allows full access to the gallery including exhibitions that otherwise involve an additional charge. This is a great way to get acquainted with the gallery and its offerings.

Wired and Hung, but not 'hung out to dry!

While it might sound a bit like I'm all strung out, getting wired and hung, what that jargon really means is several art photography pieces are now ready to be hung in an exhibit.

The many steps in a process that follow that amazing shot or capture you got are hard to imagine until you have gone through that process a few times. From submission deadlines with properly sized jpegs and artist statements or bios, to drop off and pick up dates, and then the all-important opening receptions, there are a lot of details between your inspiration, that click of the shutter, and sharing your work with a wider audience.

In my mind I think of it as 'bricks and mortar' as I need places with walls to hang the pieces that have been printed or rendered, some in response to particular themed exhibits and others to please my sensibilities. None of those artful shots do any good in my basement or on my walls.

Hence, I have joined close to a baker's dozen of arts organizations. And so now, soon to start my third year on the circuit of different shows and exhibits, I am weighing different options.

Currently I have 30 pieces of my artful photography in ten different venues. They range from hanging in a Mayor's Showcase, to a well-used and licensed café on the edges of a suburban neighbourhood, a Board of Trade office, three different offices of health care practitioners, a gallery case in a large area shopping mall, a library, Beaux Arts Gallery which is a boutique artists-run gallery in Brampton, and in the L.A.O.'s In-Camera Dining Room at Queen's Park. So far they all accomplish the same goal of 'sharing my work' or that exposure thing.

Three of these places have been successful for me in terms of resulting in actual sales of work over the past year. And it is this last thing I am now trying to better understand. This has led me to some other important questions.

While being in these places does widen the audience of who can see, appreciate, enjoy and want your work in their home or office, what is it that tips the balance for somebody to actually purchase a piece of art or photography? Does learning to target particular venues for the audiences they serve also need to be a consideration? Weighing the amount of time and expense of participating in certain exhibits and festivals, when and where does the exposure gained start to mean less, and when should you decide to forgo some of the upcoming shows? And finally, what is the best use or mix of social media to support an artist or photographer's efforts on the show, exhibit, or festival circuits?

In the meantime, please do come out to Beaux Arts Galley to enjoy the current exhibit, *Leaps and Bounds!*, and the pieces from a number of your Latow Photography Guild members: Frank Myers, Tori Martin, Monique Campbell, Wayne Elliott and me, Connie Munson. And give me a call if you'd like to 'do lunch' at the Ontario Legislature's In-Camera Dining Room with me and my piece, *Crimson Glory*, which is there until December 31, 2020.

So while it is true that the devil is in the details, it is worth it to share your pieces, listen to what people say and remember to exclaim over their pictures they want to show you on their cell phones, and to continue the balancing act of getting those artful photography pieces out there. It's **show time** folks!
