# **Members are Stepping Out**

The opportunity to exhibit our photographs is a major benefit of Latow membership. Some members, though, take this to another level by entering their work in juried exhibitions and

art auctions throughout the region.

Covid-19 caused the cancellation or postponement of many such events this year, but several have been scheduled for the fall months, though at least partially online.

The Robert McLaughlin Gallery in Oshawa is holding its annual photography competition and fundraiser in October. Three Latow members have been selected by the jury as finalists: **Tom Stephens'** image *Mayan* Illusions (aka If the Mayans Had Swimming Pools), Rolly Astrom's image Glowing Fortress and Frank Myers image NYC Architecture are all finalists. Results will be announced in November.

Frank Myers also has an image in an exhibition entitled The Carmichael Canadian Landscape Exhibition: Tradition Transformed at the Orillia Museum of Art and History. Lake Superior Pastels was selected by the jury from among 391 entries. The exhibition runs to January 17.

Glowing Fortress by Rolly Astrom is one of the prints by Latow members selected as finalists in the photography exhibition and fundraiser at the Mclaughlin Gallery in Oshawa.

**Connie Munson** has been exceptionally busy and provides the following update on what is hanging, where: Crimson Reflections is in the juried A La Carte show in the Members Only Dining Room at the Ontario Legislative Assembly. It is there until year end.

Tangled Reflections is in two juried shows currently: It's at Joshua Creek Heritage Arts Centre, with a companion piece, Mystic Realms. One is an analogue shot from over 40 years ago, the other shot in 2019 on a cell phone! Printed the same size on aluminum, Connie reports they play off each other incredibly well. At Headwaters Arts in the Alton Mill Arts Centre, it hangs in the Artful Revival Festival Exhibition. Finally, Tangled Reflections has been accepted into a third exhibition; this one is at McMichael Canadian Art Collection, opening mid-October.

Another opportunity to see your image recognized and viewed by a large audience is in competitions run by magazines such as PhotoLife. Readers of the September edition will have seen **Jim Lait's** image *Passing By* in their *Showtime* feature.

Glen Jones and Fred Oliver have taken another approach, establishing a "bricks and mortar" gallery called Studio 3 at Fred's residence in Burlington. Other members have had solo shows in the AGB's Fireside Room, at cafés and branches of Hamilton Public Library.

Exhibiting in these ways may sometimes result in a sale, but for the members, it seems to be more about the satisfaction of taking one's work to another level, showing it along with talented peers to new audiences.

# How + Why: Black and White Photography as an Aesthetic Choice: Oct. 8



New Exposures: Oct. 20

With both Don Monro and Tim Story retiring from New Exposures, I have taken on the assignment of host for the coming year.

In a subtle change from past practice, attendees will be invited to discuss "what features contribute to the success of this image?" followed by "suggestions to strengthen this image?" The intent is to draw the conversation toward the merits of the piece and its potential regardless of personal likes and preferences and, hopefully, give a better indication of how the image might fare if entered in evaluations or another judging environment.

Because it can be time-consuming, experimenting with Lightroom adjustments will be reduced. We tried this approach in the first session this year on September 15<sup>th</sup> and got an encouraging response. Most evenings, sessions are about an hour and a half of useful time. At 4 minutes per image, we are at capacity with about 22 images. So, for the next session, scheduled for October 20<sup>th</sup>, members are invited to forward a **single** jpeg image in sRGB, suitably labelled (for New Exposures), to Markemmerson@wellfoundphotography.com before 5PM on October 20<sup>th</sup>. To look their best using the Zoom technology, the long axis of images should be at least 1900 pixels.

## Street Photography: Oct. 29

## **Message from the President**

I want my photographs to be perfect. When striving for perfection, I have always held that a straight and level horizon was a basic requirement.

September's New Exposures turned out to be particularly enlightening for me. And not just because Mark Emmerson was guest hosting! It challenged and changed my view of this element I have long viewed as crucial to a great photo-graph.

Among the usual multitude of masterly images was one that stood out for me, both in the quality of the photograph and that evening's critique of it. The B&W image shows a group of young women in Harry Potter capes walking down a city street. The setting feels European. It is overcast, rainy and I would guess early evening.

The photograph draws you in. There is visible tension between subject and viewer. It holds a great story. As is the custom, we were first asked what features contribute to the success of the image. After several positive comments it was then time for everyone's favourite segment, "What are your suggestions for improvements?"



Annemarie Toth-Waddell explains the story behind her image: "The photo was taken in Porto, Portugal. The young women in the shot are wearing the traditional cloaks worn by students of the local university. J.K.Rowling lived in Porto and these were the inspiration for the outfits worn by her Harry Potter characters!"

We armchair quarterbacks stumbled over ourselves calling for the horizon to be straightened. Mark, doing an impressive Timothy Story impersonation, dutifully complied. Clicking on Lightroom's Auto Transform and refining the crop led to our perfect rendition of the image.

Then it was time for the author to weigh in. Annemarie Toth-Waddell said that she'd tried straightening the image but preferred the slight angle. She felt it better captured the topsy turvy nature of the streets of Porto, Portugal where the image was captured.

I found myself agreeing with Annemarie. The changes suggested by the group sterilized the image. The story had a key element removed. The image was less interesting. It had lost some of its tension. The glaring young woman at the middle of our story became less formidable. It made me realize that a photograph could be great without being "perfect".

#### Latow Name Working Group - A Report from the President

At last June's Board meeting, a committee was formed with the mandate to discover the origins of the Club's name. The following is a summary of their interim report, which was presented to the Board in September.

- "Latow" appears to be of Dakota/Sioux origin
- the apparent source document for the name expresses deep respect for Indigenous culture and language
- the committee found no objection on the part of Indigenous writers and commentators to the use of Indigenous terms by non-Indigenous people; on the contrary, such use was encouraged under most circumstances
- the committee also found encouragement by Indigenous writers to identify specific tribal affiliation where known rather than generic terms (eg."Dakota" would be preferable to "aboriginal")

The Board agreed that further research should be done with Indigenous language experts to confirm the precise origin and meaning of "Latow". The sole purpose of the committee is to research the origin and meaning of the club's name.


